


A take-away from Bob's demo was that when using hot-melt glue be sure to use enough glue for a strong glue joint, use a quality hi-strength glue, be sure it is hot enough for a good glue spread and note that many turners say, "don't use glue"..



The project for tonight



It is part of a sphere



Set-up



Glue joint. Be careful with this type of joint. (Use max glue surface, high quality, hi Temp glue sticks)



Note split line, only one half will ultimately be used.



Turning the sphere shape



Use of a pipe with a sharpened edge for shaping



Refining shape



Part removed, note glue residue, not a lot of glue on this joint...

A billet ready for markup



Mark for tenons on both ends as well as a cut-line



Relationship of finished grinder to marked up billet



Deliniation of the top (outboard end)



Let the chips fly!



Shaping the body of the pepper mill



Separate the top from the body. Bernie finishes the cut with the lathe stopped, using a small fine tooth saw.



This will be the upper end of the mill's bottom section



Boring out the bottom with a Forstner bit



Turn to size, careful attention to dimensions



Mount the top of the mill



Turn and measure



Bore hole for the top of the mechanism



Shape the top



Finish



Good fit!



Fastening the hardware to the top



The kit has enough length in it's parts to allow a variety in the lenght of the pepper mill
