#### Digital show and tell



Fir apple has a snug fit lid but will open with a slight twist.

The walnut platter is 9 inch diameter 1 1/2 inch high. The wood is quarter wood. The apple's stem is round leather cord from Michaels.

The Cherry bowl is 6 inch diameter with a small foot on the bottom and a thumb lip at top. This was the hardest cherry I have turned as hard as white oak.

The bowl and platter have 1 coat mineral oil and 2 coat tung oil, then Beal buffing system.

This is first time I have tried to send pics in an email.









Fancy weekly pill box

6 1/2" x 10"

Spalted Maple & Cherry,

CA glue, Ultra Shine Shellawax Cream finish

Lettering: copper powder

#### A FANCY PILL BOX


The exteriors of the base and lid were turned using a faceplate.

The base was mounted on an adapted vacuum chuck to turn the interior. Not having any plastic pipe of the right size available, I turned a tube from maple and gave it two coats of CA glue to provide a vacuum seal, which I then epoxy'd to the chuck attachment. This allowed me to slide the stand of the base into the tube and create the seal at the underside of the base. See *Picture No. 1* this is the lid, but it worked the same as the base, with the finial inside the tube and sealed around the outer surface.

To turn the pill cups in the Cherry insert, it was mounted in Jumbo Jaws See *Pictures No.2 & 3* The last time I made a Pill Box I used this set-up, using the Jumbo Jaws was much easier, though the diameter of the insert is restricted by the expansion capability of the Jumbo Jaws, and I had to make my own posts (out of corks) to get a tight fit in the off-centre position

The Copper letters were first inscribed in the wood to a depth of 1/8" in the Cherry, then filled with Copper powder and saturated with CA glue to provide a bonding agent. The result was a pretty messy application see *Picture No. 4*, but it was necessary to ensure that there were no voids in the powder that would appear as holes when the surface Copper was sanded off. Unfortunately, I had the reverse situation where I sanded completely through the Copper to the wood below. It is noticeable if you are looking for it, but to the casual eye would probably not be seen. After sanding and polishing the Copper does shine, though that is not apparent in the photo.



#### A tip or two on photos for the newsletter

Mike mentioned that this was his first time for sending photos from his phone. No criticism, but a few tips that I use for my shots and prints for the newsletter.

- Center your item of interest, in this case the apple.
- Be sure your horizon is level. It is disturbing if tilted, and it is an easy fix when you shoot, and fairly easy when editing.
- Where it is only the apple that you want, remove item that distract. This can be done later by editing
  or changing the background.
- In the case of a turning of interest place the turning on a neutral background or color that makes the turning stand out.
- Send the photos in a fairly large file size. A meg or larger is best so if I need to do any cropping I will end up with good quality and not a pixelated picture.
- I use Photoshop Elements 2020 for my editing. I have been using this product for 15+ years and have had several versions with the current one the best by far.
- It is surprising what can be edited in or out.



### "Tops for Tots" Follow-on Challenge

"Tops for Tots" is a good turning pastime/project during our enforced isolation due to Covid-19. Those made and collected have been passed on to the kids. It is of interest to note that collectively the Guild members have turned **535 tops to date!** 

#### How does a target of 1000 tops sound? That is 465 tops!

We will have a collection box available once we are back to normal.

Please remember the guidelines for tops:

- One piece
- Minimum size. At least 1.75" (45 mm) diameter (smaller tops are a choke hazard)
- No sharp points or edges

- Sand to 400 grit
- If you are colouring them use water-based markers only
- No finish unless you wish to use carnauba wax
- No wood from nut producing trees



## AAW has a unique idea for replacing the cancelled symposium and announces a virtual woodturning event July 10-12

- Each registered attendee may send an image to include in the Virtual Instant Gallery.
- The cost for all three days of programming is \$20.20 (non-refundable), which includes access to a replay
  of recorded Virtual Symposium content for up to two weeks following the event.
