November meeting

Our demonstration was marbling and applying a marbleize finish to turned pieces, ably demonstrated by Bernie Hrytzak. There is a lot of chemistry and physics in the marbleizing technique, akin to a magic show. Once the techniques were explained and witnessed the process seems relatively straightforward albeit somewhat magical.

My explanation is as follows.

First prepare your turning to be marbleized by pre-treating with an alum solution (acts like a primer).

Prepare your main solution (water + Carageenan)

Skim the surface of the liquid with a newspaper to remove contaminants and release surface tension.

Apply drop(s) of color (acrylic air brush paints) – undiluted. Drops are applied, one in each quadrant of the liquid's surface. The color expands and you end up with four color rings, one in each quadrant, rings that have expanded into close proximity.

Add more and different colors, one at a time, using more or less drops of paint, this effecting the width of the color bands.

When you have sufficient color applied, laying on the surface in four distinct groupings it is time to manipulate the color. This is done with a toothpick. You carefully move the edges of the color rings into a pleasing pattern. Other things such as brushes, combs feathers etc may be used to move the color over the surface.





Once the paint pattern is as desired it is time to apply it to the pre-treated turning. The object is carefully inserted and moved through the surface paint and removed in a smooth flowing motion. The paint that was lying on the surface adheres to the wood. The object is then dipped in clear water to rinse and set the marbleized paint pattern. The object is then set aside to dry.

To quote Bernie "I haven't had so much fun for so little in the hobby field in a long time". Expenses are limited to several chemical supplies, containers, and acrylic paints (air brush acrylics have been found to be excellent) plus a few odds and ends such as small bottles, newspaper, and eye-droppers.

The following series of photos show how the process for doing the "floral" pattern was done plus a complex combed pattern.

The following history and sources pertaining to marbleizing have been provided by Bernie. A Google search will provide you with more information if you wish to pursue it.

Marbling

Started almost 1000 yrs. ago in the Middle East

This was paper and fabric marbleizing

The earliest papers still in existence are from Turkey from the 1500's.

Wood marbleizing is fairly new to woodturners as we are known today, although there might have been some Chinese marbling done on furniture legs earlier.

Mary Thouin wrote an article for AAW a few years ago, and has worked as an artist in decorated woodturnings this way.

Allan Lacer has a limited demonstration on YouTube.

Working with wood requires consideration for the curves and varying geometry of turned items as the pattern will stretch as the piece is marbleized. A random pattern seems to work better with 3 dimensional work as in bowls, vases and platters.

A method of holding and rotating a piece while dealing with air bubbles is also required.

CARAGEENAN - An extract from seaweed called Irish Moss 3 tbsp/gallon of water

ALUM - Should be pure Al Sulphate (no Potassium or Ammonia) 1 1/4 Alum per cup of water

Container (light colored) for carageenan/water (size)

Container for Alum mixture, to dunk, and/or a brush for applying

Blender

Stir stick

Rakes, (wood strip with nails protruding)

Sheets of precut newspaper

Plastic sheet for anti-marbleizing of tabletop!

Container for bath water or rinse station

Anticipation control



Marbleizing paints



Golden acrylics



Opaque air brush acrylics



Rakes for complex patterns



Transparent air brush acrylics



"Custom" Brushes from a cheap broom are used for manipulating color using spatter techniques

Interest ran high on this technique and Bernie will hold two marbleizing seminars for interested members. To date he has about 15 people signed up. The sessions are hands-on and will run a full day, 10 people per session. The cost is estimated to be \$35which will include supplied and containers for each student, bring your own lunch. December meeting

The December demonstration "**How to make a bowl from a flat board**" was ably presented by Patrick Sutherland and Fred Roger.

Bowls from a board can take many forms, a single board, laminated with a variety of woods i.e. A layered board, boards laminated with different boards like a cutting board. The idea is to cut a number of accurately sized rings from one board and then glue-up and turn to your final bowl shape. While many of the bowls turned are normally seen as a tapered relatively flat sided profile creative cutting of the rings can give more curved profiles.

There are a number of ways to decide the size and angles of your rings from careful drawing and measuring to the use of special design software or CAD systems.

As there are different ways to design your bowls there are also different ways to cut your rings. First is of course using your lathe freehand or with angled cutting guides for your chisels (a guide was developed by Fred and may be available from Al Johnson), a band-saw (this results in a split in each ring for saw access, use of a scroll saw and last the purchase of pre-cut kits.

The series of demonstration pieces shown by Fred and Patrick show us that the scope and variety of bowls can be quite wide including more conventional curved profiles. The demo pieces also showed a number of "learning experiences". To minimize the "learning experiences" with valuable lumber Patrick has experimented with laminations of MDF to further the lay-ups and use of angles at lesser cost (a caution about MDF is it is a dust maker and rapidly dulls your tools.


