Eric Deckert demonstrated the making of a wand, a timely item with Halloween coming up. Majic wands made popular by the Harry Potter movies give the turner a small spindle job to keep his fingers limbered up. A little forward planning is a good idea. A sketch or story board showing you the size and length of the handle, the hilt, and the wand's barrel is a good start. Remember there are generally for kids so keep the smaller scale in mind.

This is a good place to use up those small decorative pieces of exotic woods you have been saving. You also have an opportunity to try some fancy work like spirals, carving the handle, or laminating.

The following photos show some of the steps Eric went through, however time ran out and we didn't see the finished wand. We will put a picture in a later issue.



Coming Challenges

Several challenges have been identified for the upcoming season and we have listed them well in advance so that you may begin planning your winning entry.

The "Circle" challenge for February's meeting

This is a little different challenge. Turning is to be your interpretation of "Circle". The execution and parameters are for you to decide. Rather than have this as a "People's Choice", judging will be by the Guild's executive.

An egg challenge for April's meeting

Based on but not limited by Bob's demo in March. No limit on size, decoration, or material(s).

A Member's turning challenge for June's meeting

John Calver has submitted a challenge to the executive which has been approved for the June meeting. This advance notice gives the membership lots of time to be creative. Unlike past challenges there is no "class of entry", all entries will be judged by the same criteria which are:

- 1. The turning must fit within a 6" cube
- 2. There must be a minimum of two species of wood with a minimum of different wood colors
- 3. Part of the turned piece must be embellished (including painted, stained, dyed, bleached, but not limited to these techniques)
- 4. You may also use alternate materials, texturing, carving, or piercing. This element is to be a feature of the turning and should not dominate the turning
- 5. Care should be taken in the "fit and finish" of the turning.

Prior to voting, each turning will be reviewed by the coordinator of Challenges - Bernie, for compliance to all of the rules.

Sounds like a challenge to get everyone's creative juices flowing and lots of time to produce it.




October meeting

Our October meeting featured Dave bell turning a Sierra pen. While many of us have turned pens Dave has take the time to refine a number of steps in the process to eliminate a number of problems inherent in the normal procedures. Rather than detail each step I will attempt to highlight his changes/improvements over the usual method.



Bore the hole using the lathe, not a drill press. Dave uses a standard drill bit




Mixing pad for epoxy to glue the brass tube into the blank



Using a dowel or rod apply the epoxy to the inside of tube




Using applicator/stick/dowel ensure brass tube is coated as it is inserted. Note tube ends have been plugged with



Bandsaw cutting sled for accurate and <u>safe</u> cutting of blanks



Add color when using a transparent blank - to prevent brass from showing through



Small sanding disc chucked in a collet. Collets may be used for centering if you have them or use a stub MT taper



Use a little wax to protect the Blank's ends from CA used later on in the finishing process



60 degree MT centres used in lieu pen turning mandrel



Bushings are use with a small 60 deg chamfers for good contact with the centers for precise centering. You always get a little out-of-round using a pen turning mandrel



Keep your tools sharp, this of course shortens them and will require eventual replacement



After the desired shape is reached sand through your grits



Carry on with Micro-fibre sanding



Dave's preferred CA is the thick version for applying his finish



Watching the application of multiple coats of CA by Dave during the break



Measuring the diameter so he will know how much CA is applied



Apply CA. Dave prefers to let it dry by itself then apply layers until sufficient build-up.



Once he has enough CA built up he is then able to carefully turn down to the final thickness



Wet sanding brings out the gloss
